As a major social planning agency in North Toronto, it is essential that POINT be able to rapidly assimilate and disseminate information. We could no longer function without a computer!

We are currently in our 1989 Membership Drive, and have mailed our Special Edition request for donations. To our many faithful supporters, many thanks for your generous contributions. We anticipate your continuing assistance, and seek you help in emphasizing our impact on the community. Please involve your friends and neighbours in our activities. A perfect opportunity to accomplish this will occur on Monday, May 29 when POINT will host our Annual Theatre Night. What a wonderful occasion to mingle with friends, meet new people, enjoy Toronto's fine Theatre, and at the same time, support POINT.

Following our exciting 20th Anniversary Celebration Year, we at POINT are not content to rest on our laurels. In October, POINT, in co-operation with the City of Toronto Department of Parks and Recreation, ran a very informative two day workshop on Leadership Development for the Seniors in North Toronto. This was the first time a networking, information sharing seminar on "Leadership" has been orchestrated for North Toronto Seniors. Plans are underway with Parks and Recreation for other such seminars.

POINT's programs for 1989 have been formulated with the assistance and suggestions of the participants of our Fall Agency Marketplace, our POINT Community Advisors and the Program Planning Committee. The Board of POINT has approved the following programs:

- I. Senior's Directory: an updated publication of the Directory of Community Services for Seniors in North Toronto will be available in the spring.
- Housing Task Force: initial meeting was held in December to research the current work being done in the area of housing by other groups in North Toronto
 - a public meeting is being organized to further educate the people of North Toronto on the increasing problems of housing in our area.
- 3. Substance Abuse: to be held in late April or early May
 - "We Are What We Put In Our Bodies", a workshop designed to share information and tackle the difficult subjects of legal/illegal drugs, alcohol and chemical substances we ingest.
- 4. Annual Meeting: anticipate engaging a speaker who will address the continuing awareness needed to build and keep a healthy neighbourhood. We must all become giving, sharing and caring citizens.
- 5. Directory of Tutors in North Toronto: a "Where to Find" list, covering the educational needs in our community.
- 6. Creative Boardmanship Workshop: to be held in the fall of '89. Additional information will be forthcoming in future POINT BY POINT issues.
- 7. The North Toronto Health Centre Steering Committee, led by POINT, has finally aquired

the former Metro Police, 53 Division building at Yonge Street and Montgomery Avenue for a Health Centre. We continue to work on program proposals and funding sources for the Centre.

POINT will continue to be involved in the Board of Education's process of adopting our In-School Program for Children of Single Parents into the Schools in our area. Refinements of the Program are expected to be extensive, and we will continue to monitor the process.

The strength of POINT is in the commitment of our members. Our Board of Directors is a dedicated group of hard-working volunteers. We are endeavouring to improve this community we live in, and we both enjoy and learn from our varied involvements. As a member of POINT, and the North Toronto community, become involved and give us your support! Help strengthen the North Toronto community!
