# Having a Say in New City Official Plan

In March, 1999 the Toronto City Council approved "The Framework for the New Official Plan for Toronto" and launched its New Official Plan process. At present, the City of Toronto currently has seven official plans dating from before the amalgamation of the municipalities. This new planning process is an attempt to make sense of the common values and interests of the diverse communities across the city.

POINT has always been proactive in shaping the social landscape of North Toronto. As a social planning and development agency. POINT was in the forefront of developing The Anne Johnston Health Station, a driving force behind the creation of the North Toronto Community Centre and in the initiation of programs such as the City of Toronto Block Parent Program, and the Upper Yonge Village Day Care Centre.

In its role as a social planning agent, POINT decided to facilitate a series of community meetings to provide a forum for people to discuss planning issues and priorities in North Toronto due to the social implication of any official plan. POINT then compiled a brief report summarizing any consensus reached, for submission to the City Planning Department as part of the New Official Plan process.

On June 8th POINT sponsored its first community meeting on the new

Official Plan and invited local ratepayer and environmental groups, and welcomed individuals who expressed an interest. The first meeting was an information session with Paul Bedford of the city's planning department. The three follow-up meetings allowed participants to share their diverse views of our community and the problems we all face in Toronto.

Through the community meetings, most people agreed that "North Toronto is a community valued by its residents and merchants. Recent arrivals mix with families who have lived in the area for generations. We are actively concerned with children's and seniors' issues. Change can be positive but also potentially disruptive. We are citizens who expect to be heard on matters that affect the place where we live".

Many thanks to all who participated in the meetings, and for providing valuable insight and input to form the North Toronto Community Official Plan submission.

POINT has benefited greatly over the past ten years from the exceptional contributions made by these volunteers. Through their leadership, support of new initiatives and commitment to existing programs, POINT has been able to meet the needs and strengthen the North Toronto community.

Since 1993 **Joan Berndt** has been a moving force within POINT. Joan has provided leadership as Chair of the Board and further developed the organization by taking an active role in fund raising, volunteer recruitment and latterly by chairing the PLANTSS (Planning for Senior Services in North Toronto) Committee.

Mary Brereton has been an active participant in the success of POINT. Throughout her ten year involvement with POINT, she has been Chair of the POINT Board, a member of the Ewart Angus Homes Board, and a member of the PLANTSS Committee.

Supporting new community initiatives, **Fran Brown** was the key POINT representative in the planning and development of The Anne Johnston Health Station from 1986 to 1992. Recently Fran was a member of, and Co-chaired, the POINT Ambassador Group. Over the past twelve years, Fran has also provided leadership to POINT as a board member, Chair of the POINT Board and Chair of the Nominating Committee.

Over the past five years, **Michael Johnson** has offered direction to PLANTSS as a member and Chair of the Housing Sub-Committee, and is presently a member of the Board of Ewart Angus Homes. (POINT has been a supporter in the development of Ewart Angus Homes).

**Cynthia Luks** has been involved with POINT for eleven years as both a member and Chair of the POINT Board and PLANTSS committee. Cynthia is currently Co-chair of the the PLANTSS Abbeyfield Homes Sub-Committee. This is an exciting and innovative concept aimed at developing new housing for seniors.

Since we are living in an age of information, accessing information is critical. **Alma Stoneman** has played a key role in the development and growth of POINT's Community Information Service (CIS). Since 1993 Alma has been a CIS volunteer, trained new CIS volunteers and has also been a valued member on the CIS Committee.

# **POINT To Launch A Community Needs Assessment**

Throughout its thirty year history, People and Organizations in North Toronto (POINT) has worked with other organizations and individuals to identify social issues and gaps in services in the North Toronto community. POINT is pleased to announce that the Stratton Fund, part of the portfolio of the Toronto Community Foundation, has approved funding for POINT to carry out a community needs assessment.

North Toronto has worked well as a community, because of the outstanding contributions by volunteers and agencies. But North Toronto cannot be complacent. Our population and

the world around us are changing. At the same time, funding constraints have reduced the capacity of agencies and voluntary organizations to look beyond existing mandates.

During the next nine months,

a working group will seek advice and information from organizations and individuals in North Toronto about the current and future needs of our community. After preliminary consultation, in-depth profiles will be developed of significant needs. The profiles will identify related issues, existing services, systemic barriers and potential partners, then there will be further community consultation refining the profiles and seeking collaborations for evolving strategy planning.

The project will lay a foundation on which to build community capacity to respond to current and future needs of those who live, work or go to school in North Toronto. The project's approach will be collaborative and nonpartisan. For further information, call Diane Werner at POINT 487-2390.

# Youth Will Have A Greater Voice In North Toronto

Coming to North Toronto this autumn is an exciting new development for the empowerment of youth. The North Toronto Forum on Youth Issues (NTFYI) hopes to provide a forum within which youth can voice their concerns regarding the issues that affect their daily lives and suggest innovative new ways in which to solve them.

Though youth make up nearly 10% of the population of North Toronto, their ideas can often go unnoticed as there are few places in which young people can take part in the decision making process. This vast under representation presents a barrier to youth which can lead to a feeling of isolation from the larger community. NTFYI seeks to remove that barrier, empowering youth to take a proactive role within North

Toronto! NTFYI will have its inaugural meeting on November 16, 1999 from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. at the North Toronto Memorial Community Centre. The meeting will focus upon the increasing concern of youth homelessness. Those in attendance will have a chance to debate the issue and develop a strategy by which NTFYI could help by playing its part in addressing this concern. There will also be an opportunity to discuss any other topics of interest introduced by those in attendance.

The NTFYI presents a unique opportunity for young people to take part in the decision making process, be heard on issues that matter to them, and take action on those issues. In doing so young people will contribute to in their community, and strengthen the social fabric of North Toronto.
