SECOND SUITES: Getting an Electrical Safety Inspection

If you are planning to set up a second suite rental unit in your house, then complying with electrical safety regulations is of prime importance. After a second suite has been created, homeowners should call the Electrical

Safety Authority and arrange for an inspection. Ensure you specifically request a General Inspection for Fire Code compliance of Two Unit Residential Dwelling. The inspection requires that both the homeowner unit and the rental unit be inspected. Fees for this will be \$79/unit totaling \$169.06 including tax. Electrical inspections can be arranged and paid for over the phone if you use a credit card, simply call 1-877-esa-safe.

In general, the inspector will check to ensure that the electrical service you have is safe and useable. A visual inspection will be done to see if the existing wiring and electrical service meets the requirements of the Ontario Electrical Safety Code. Inspections are based on the requirements defined in the Code that existed when the work was done.

Following an inspection, a homeowner is required to correct any electrical defects in the units that do not meet safety requirements defined by the Ontario Electrical Safety Code. Prior to making these corrections, you will be required to file an application for electrical inspection to ensure that any electrical wiring work that is done meets Code requirements. Once all electrical safety standards and requirements have been met you will receive a certificate of inspection. 
Q. Are there any ecological/nature walks occurring in North Toronto during the winter?

A. A very good resource to refer you to is the North Toronto Green Community. The NTGC is our local environmental organization. They co-ordinate projects and activities that conserve resources, prevent pollution, and protect greenspace and natural ecological precesses, as well as promote alternative sources of energy and transportation. The NTGC focuses on action at the level of the household and local community.

The North Toronto Green Community is committed to restoring the Don River watershed to the state of a healthy vibrant living habitat. The NTGC got involved in the Lost River Walks project to help people appreciate their intimate connections to the water systems that form an essential part of their lives. Lost River Walks is a joint project of the NTGC, the Toronto Field Naturalists and community partners including Hike Ontario. Since 1995, over 5000 people have participated in the Lost River Walks, which are now a part of the Ontario Legacy Trail Program—a designation that recognizes us as one of the 24 best walking programs or trail systems in the province.

The NTGC was the recent recipient of the 2003 Heritage Toronto Award of Excellence for their work promoting natural heritage, and linking human and natural heritage through both the Lost River Walks and the Eglinton Park Heritage Community Garden.
