The NEW North Toronto Seniors Housing Directory is here!

"This is a project that we have wanted to complete for a long time." said, Community Information Service Co-ordinator, Janice Webster. North Toronto has a sizable senior population. Many people have raised their families in their homes here. Now, as they have become "seniors", it can become difficult to maintain the upkeep of a home. It is natural when contemplating a move to some form of a residence for seniors that you would want to continue to live in the

community that you know so well.

"Increasingly over the past few years POINT has received a number of enquiries both from seniors and adult children on behalf of their parents as to what types of accommodation there is for seniors in North Toronto. It was obvious that we needed to consolidate this information and put it into a booklet." said Webster. A grant was received from

the Government of Canada's New Horizons for Seniors program that covered most of the cost which allowed a few thousand copies to be printed. The various types of accommodation listed in the booklet include: retirement homes; life lease residences; independent seniors' apartments; a cooperative; government subsidized seniors' apartments; supportive housing (also known as assisted living); and long-term care

Webster noted that from the accommodation chart on the inside cover, what strikes you the most is how heavily North Toronto is dominated by retirement homes compared to every other type of accommodation.

However, most of the queries that POINT receives are from seniors that cannot afford to live in a retirement home. "This imbalance really shows the need for more affordable housing for seniors. Seniors are shocked to learn that the waiting lists for various subsidized housing are very long. They feel that they are between a 'rock and a hard place'. Even with selling a home in North

Toronto they are not confident that they can afford a retirement home, but wonder at the same time if they can outlive a multi-year (in some cases) waiting list."

options for seniors,
particularly through its
PLANTSS (Planning in
North Toronto for Seniors'
Services) Committee

members." She stated that "POINT has held several forums dealing with the issue of affordable housing for seniors over the past years to bring public attention to this critical issue." POINT is now in the process of distributing these booklets to agencies who serve seniors, faith groups, seniors' clubs, local libraries in the North Toronto community, as well as to ethno-cultural organizations. Unfortunately, we are unable to mail out copies. If you would like a copy for yourself or a friend or relative, they can be picked up at the POINT office at no cost.



The North Toronto Community Fair

"I've lived in North Toronto for so many years and I didn't know that this agency provided these services. This is so close to where I live." Every year this sentiment is stated regularly by different people when POINT holds the North Toronto Community Fair. This is one of many reasons we have this annual Fair; because despite all of our publicity, there are always more people for us to reach out to. The North Toronto Community Fair, in its 11th year, was held last October in the Yonge-Eglinton Centre. This thriving Fair had representation from the best of what North Toronto has to offer: The Anne Johnston Health Station: Central Eglinton Community Centre: North York Women's Centre: Parents in Transition; Parkdale Golden Age Foundation; SAINTS (Student Assistance in North Toronto for Seniors); Self Help Resource Centre; Second Mile Club, Orchard View Branch; SPRINT (Senior Peoples' Resources in North Toronto); Sunnybrook Health Science Centre. Health Information Centre; Toronto Public Health; Toronto Public Library, Northern District Branch; and Yorkminster Park Meals on Wheels. Agency participants were eager to let people know about their programs and events. The day's energy level increased dramatically, when soul singer, Jay Douglas with keyboardist Rick MacIntosh entertained everyone with his velvety voice - you can't help but sway your hips or tap your toes!

Rio Can partially co-sponsored the North Toronto Community Fair and assisted with the publicity inside the mall. Once again, Yonge-Eglinton mall merchants livened up the Fair by donating products or gift certificates. COMMUNITY RESOURCES

Q: Someone told me about "Good Food Boxes", boxes filled with fresh fruits and vegetables coming from local farmers and the Ontario Food Terminal. Where can I get these boxes in North Toronto?

A: Good Food Boxes are increasing in popularity. There are a variety of boxes to choose from with the price range from \$12 to \$32. Organic food boxes are priced at the higher price range.

Eglinton St. George United Church 35 Lytton Boulevard, (corner of Lytton Blvd. and Duplex Ave.) has run this program for almost 10 years. They handle approximately 40-50 orders per month; with the third Thursday of the month being the day that most people pick up their order. Some boxes are delivered. You get a free box for every 10 boxes ordered. Contact: Janet Whitney, 416-223-4509.

The Salvation Army's North Toronto Citadel, 7 Eglinton Avenue East, (Yonge St. and Eglinton Ave.) has operated their program for about three years. They average about 50 customers. Orders are sent in each Tuesday for pick up the following Thursday and they will be available for pick-up between noon and 7 p.m. that day. Generally there is no delivery service. The Anne Johnston Health Station has recently started this program in the last year. Orders and payments are placed on the first Wednesday of the month. Afterwards, you can pick up your order; deliveries are made on the third Wednesday of the month. Contact: Lyndsay Tchegus, Health Promoter, 416-486-8666 ext. 266.

Separate from the Good Food Box program, the Yonge-Eglinton Apple Tree Market, (formerly known as the North Toronto Fresh Food Market held at Eglinton St. George United Church last year), will set up an outdoor fresh food market behind the North Toronto Memorial Community Centre, 200 Eglinton Avenue West, on Thursday, April 23. This year round market will operate weekly on Thursdays, 3:00 pm to 7:00 pm. Food will come from local farmers and producers. Some vendors will be Scotch Mountain Meats, St. John's Bakery and Kawartha Ecological Growers. As well, expect to see displays from artisans and eco-conscious organizations.
